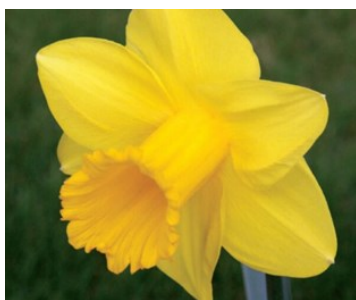


2024 GCV Daffodil Collection of Classics

The American Daffodil Society include in its awards a section for named standard cultivars of Classic Daffodils. Classic Daffodils would be defined as those registered between 1940 and 1969, inclusive.



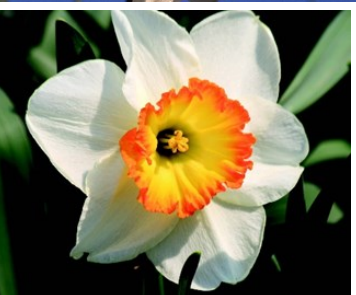
Arkle 1Y-Y, Registered in 1968 by J. Lionel Richardson of Ireland. Arkle is part of Richardson's "Race Horse Series". Named after a very successful Irish racehorse of the 1960's. It is a deep golden yellow with broadly ovate perianth and cylindrical corona, rim flanged. Blooms early to mid-season.



Cassata 11A W-W, Registered in 1963 by J. Gerritsen and Son of the Netherlands. Perianth segments broadly ovate and greenish white. The corona is split to the base opening greenish yellow, becoming whitish. Early to Mid-season.



Pueblo 7 W-W, Registered in 1966 by Grant E. Mitsch of Oregon, USA. Corona opening lemon yellow turning milk white. One to five flowers to a stem. Spreading perianth. Dwarf. Mid-season to Late.



Roulette 2W-YYO, Registered 1959 by J.J. Grullemans and Sons of the Netherlands. Perianth segments creamy white. Corona brilliant greenish yellow, with strong orange rim. Mid-Season.



Sir Winston Churchill 4W-O, Registered 1966. Named in honor of Sir Winston Churchill Prime Minister of the UK from 1940-1945. Average four blooms per stem. Perianth and other petaloid segments are white. Corona segments shorter than center whorl, orange. Strongly scented. Late Season.

2023 Garden Club of Virginia Daffodil Collection “Joyful”

‘HAPPY SMILES’ 2W-WYO blooms mid to late Spring. This daffodil will brighten your day with its outward facing apricot rimmed pale yellow cup with a green eye surrounded by pristine white petals; 14”-17” .



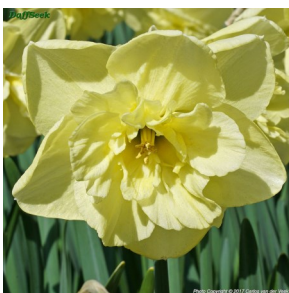
‘SWEET OCEAN’ 4WWY-YYO blooms mid-Spring. This beautiful ‘double’ daffodil has shades of cream, yellow., orange and pink. It is sweetly fragrant and can have up to two blooms per stem. This lovely bloom is the perfect addition to your garden and arrangements. 12-16”



‘SUGAR DIPPED’ 6W-Y blooms mid-Spring. This adorable bloom has white to soft yellow ,slightly reflexed petals that surround a slender bright yellow corona that bleeds into the petals at the base.. The cup is very frilly at the end on occasion it has white flecks in the frills. 10-



‘SILVER SMILES’ 7W-Y blooms mid to late Spring. A wonderful Brent and Becky hybrid, this bloom will add a lovely fragrance and beauty to your garden and the show bench. It has smooth, great substance. The soft yellow cup will fade to a creamy white as it matures. 12-14”



‘DANCING MOONLIGHT’ 11b Y-Y blooms mid–Spring. This intriguing daffodil will provide so much beauty to your garden with its soft pastel yellow petals and matching cup. It is a lovely example of the 11b Papillion variety. 16-18”

‘Le Torch’ 4 Y-R ‘Le Torch’ is a beautiful bright 4 will be great addition to your garden. The perianth are a deep golden yellow complimented by the interspersed deep red corona segments. It blooms mid-late season. Registered by Brian S. Duncan of Northern Ireland in



‘ Doll Baby’ 7W-P ‘ Doll Baby’ Blooms mid-season. This adorable daffodil sometimes has two per stem. Dwarf height-less than 32.5 cm (12.8 in) . The perianth are a glistening white and the corona is a clear pink. Nicely scented. Hybridizer: Elizabeth Tainter (Mrs. John Brewster) Capen, 1985.



‘Kiss me’ 1W-Y ‘Kiss me’ blooms early to mid-season. The perianth are light greenish yellow that age to almost white. The corona is a vivid yellow that is funnel shaped lightly ribbed, expanding at the mouth.

Registered in 2005 by Paul van Bentem Bloembollen. Hybr: Veek



‘Winter Waltz’ 6W-P 11a Y-Y This sweet daffodil blooms early to mid-season with reflexed creamy white perianth and a buff turning Pinkish apricot corona. Registered in 1988 by Grant Mitsch and Elise Havens.



‘Sweet Love’ 7W-YYW ‘Sweet Love’ is a mid-season bloomer. Two flowers per stem. The ivory white broadly ovated perianth surround the butter yellow bowl-shaped corona.(the corona edge will lighten with maturity). Lightly scented. Brent and Becky Bulbs, 2008

2021 GCV Daffodil Collection “Split Decision”

This year’s collection of Split Corona Daffodils (“the butterfly daffodil”) are sure to be a wonderful addition to your gardens. The blooms in division 11a are defined by their split coronas hence the name “Split Decision”. The “decision” part is reflecting all the new decisions of the past year. ‘Congress’ 11a Y-O This is a very showy daffodil registered in 1976 by J.Gerritsen and Son of the Netherlands. The Petals are a brilliant greenish yellow that contrast beautifully with the deep orange corona. It blooms mid to late season.



‘Electrus’ 11a W-GPP This lovely up-facing daffodil is known for its smooth heavy substance. The pure white perianth are slightly reflexed while the pink corona segments curve perfectly over the petals. ‘Electrus’ was Registered by Brian Duncan of Northern Ireland in 2001. It blooms mid-season.



‘Plant America’ 11a W-Y This is a mid-season blooming daffodil that grows best in full sun. The buttery yellow split corona fold beautifully over the white perianth. This daffodil is up-facing with a nice thick substance making for a long lasting flower.



‘Sailorman’ 11a Y-Y This enthusiastic daffodil was registered by J.Gerritsen and Son of the Netherlands in 2009. The perianth and corona are both a brilliant greenish yellow making a bold statement in your garden. The corona are heavily frilled. It also has a sweet scent. It blooms mid-season.



‘Sovereign’ 11a W-O This daffodil was registered by J. Gerritsen and Son of the Netherlands in 1973. Its ivory white perianth are the perfect backdrop for its deep yellow–orange split corona. A real show stopper. It blooms mid to late season.

2020 GCV Daffodil Collection

“Blue Ribbon Collection ”

While, sadly, we do not have a GCV Daffodil Day Show to attend this year, we do have time to prepare for an excellent show in 2021. Part of that preparation is choosing now the bulbs to plant that will be future winners. With that in mind, the GCV Daffodil Committee has chosen a collection of show quality daffodils for the 2020 Test Collection. Each of these varieties has proven itself as a blue-ribbon winner.

Plus, all are reliable for Virginia gardens.

The bulbs are: ‘Altruist’ (3O-R); Falmouth Bay’ (3W-GWW); ‘Gay Tabor’ (4W-O); ‘Mallee’ (11aW-YPP); and ‘Ringtone’ (3Y-YYO)

The collection may be ordered as a set from Brent & Becky’s Bulbs at a cost of \$24 plus tax and shipping for three bulbs of each variety. Order as Item # 47-0155 (a copy of the order form is attached). The individual varieties may also be found from other bulb sources such as Scheepers, McClure & Zimmerman, Colorblends, etc. Even if your club is not meeting in person this month, please distribute the daffodil collection information. It is advisable to order now for fall delivery.

2020 GCV Daffodil Collection “Blue Ribbon Collection”

Described below is the daffodil collection for 2020. This year’s selections are daffodils known to perform well both in shows and in the garden. The special characteristics of each variety are detailed with their pictures. Look on the American Daffodil Society’s site www.DaffSeek.org for more photos and information about each. (Pictures from DaffSeek).



‘Altruist’ 3 O-R This is a Classic daffodil registered in 1965 and hybridized by Frederick Board of England. It is known for the vivid color of the petals and cup which make it really catch your eye on the show bench or in the garden. Its bloom season is late.



‘Falmouth Bay’ 3 W-GWW This large pristine white flower was registered in 1990 by Ron Scamp of England. The pure white is set off by a green eye deep in the cup. It is a mid-season bloomer.



‘Gay Tabor’ 4 W-O This is a beautiful and full double daffodil perfect for arrangements as well as showing. It was registered in 2016 and hybridized by J. Lionel Richardson of Ireland, so can be shown as part of an entry for the GCV show’s Frizzell award. It blooms mid-season.



‘Mallee’ 11a W-YPP The luscious coloring and shading of the cup of this daffodil makes it particularly attractive. It is bred by Brian Duncan of Northern Ireland and registered in 2001. It blooms mid-season. It is also eligible for entry in the Frizzell class.



‘Ringtone’ 3Y-YYO ‘Ringtone’ has a very pale yellow perianth and a prominent orange rim. Karel J. van der Veek of the Netherlands hybridized it and registered it in 2015. It is sweetly scented. It blooms early to mid-season.

2019 GCV Daffodil Collection “By the Numbers, Continued”

Described below is the daffodil collection for 2019. This year’s selections are samples of Divisions 6-11 daffodils. The special characteristics of each variety are detailed with their pictures. Look on the American Daffodil Society’s site www.DaffSeek.org for more photos and information about each. (Pictures from DaffSeek).



‘Orange Comet’ 6 W-YYO As a Division 6 (Cyclamineus) daffodil, this has a single flower per stem, strongly reflexed petals, a down-facing pose, and a short neck. It is an early-midseason bloomer bred and introduced by Brent and Becky Heath in 2014 but not yet registered.



‘Beautiful Eyes’ 7 Y-O This is a Division 7 (Jonquilla and Apodanthus) daffodil. Division 7 daffodils are the true jonquils. They commonly have one to five florets per stem and are fragrant. ‘Beautiful Eyes’ blooms in mid-season and was registered by Brent Heath in 2004.



‘Geranium’ 8 W-O This is a familiar Division 8 daffodil found in many old gardens. Division 8 (Tazetta) daffodils usually have three to twenty florets on a stout stem and are very fragrant. ‘Geranium’ has won several awards as a good garden daffodil. It was hybridized by J. B. van der Schoot of the Netherlands and registered before 1930. Because it was registered before 1940, it is classified by the American Daffodil Society as an Historic daffodil.



‘Actaea’ 9 W-YYR Division 9 daffodils (Poeticus) and may be called “poets” because they are similar to the species daffodils *Narcissus poeticus*. They usually have a single flower per stem with pure white petals and a very small, disc-shaped cup. Most have a fine red rim at the edge of the cup. Many are late bloomers, but ‘Ornatus’ may bloom mid-season before most poets. Hybridized by G. Lubbe and Son of the Netherlands, it was registered before 1919 so is an Historic daffodil.



‘Smiling Twin’ 11a W-Y Division 11 (Split-Corona) daffodils have cups that are divided into sections, usually 6 sections and may have one or more florets per stem. ‘Smiling Twin’ was hybridized by Brent Heath and registered in 2003. As the name suggests, it usually has two florets per stem. It blooms mid-season to late.

2018 GCV Daffodil Collection “By the Numbers”

Described below is the daffodil collection for 2018. This year’s selections are samples of Divisions 1-5 daffodils. The special characteristics of each variety are detailed with their pictures. Look on the American Daffodil Society’s site www.DaffSeek.org for more photos and information about each. (Pictures from DaffSeek).



‘Growers Pride’ 1 Y-Y Division 1 (Trumpet daffodils) daffodils have a single bloom per stem and a cup (trumpet) longer than the petal length. They may be any overall size from very large to miniature. ‘Growers Pride’ is small enough (less than 80mm) to qualify for the special class of Intermediates. Thus, it can be exhibited as a regular standard daffodil or in its special Intermediate class. It was hybridized by Langeveld & Sons of the Netherlands and registered in 2015. It blooms in early to mid-season.



‘Snowboard’ 2 W-GWW Division 2 (Large-cupped) Division 2 has single flowers with the cup more than 1/3 but less than equal to the perianth segments (petals) It was hybridized by Karel van der Veeck of the Netherlands and registered in 2013. It blooms mid-season.



‘Barrett Browning’ 3 WWY-O Division 3 (Small-cupped) Division 3 has a single flower per stem with a cup not more than 1/3 the length of the petals. J.W.A. Lefeber of the Netherlands is the hybridizer. It was registered in 1945, making it a Classic daffodil (those registered from 1940-1969). It blooms early to med-season.



‘Bridal Crown’ 4 W-Y Division 4 (Double) Division 4 daffodils may have one or more flowers per stem with doubling of the petals (perianth segments) or cup or both. ‘Bridal Crown’ was hybridized by J. Schoori of the Netherlands and registered in 1949, making it another Classic daffodil. It blooms in mid-season. It is strongly scented.



‘Sunlight Sensation’ 5 Y-Y Division 5 daffodils (Triandrus) usually have two or more pendant flowers per stem and petals that are reflexed back from the cup. The division is called Triandrus because the flowers look similar, and are often genetically related, to the wild species daffodil ‘Narcissus triandrus’. This one is bred by Karel van der Veeck of the Netherlands and registered by Brent & Becky’s Bulbs in 2016. It is sweetly scented. It blooms in mid-season.

2017 GCV Daffodil Collection

Described below is the daffodil collection for 2017. This year's selections are all varieties with pink in their cups. The special characteristics of each variety are detailed with their pictures. Look on the American Daffodil Society's site www.DaffSeek.org for more photos and information about each. (Pictures from DaffSeek).



'Brooke Ager' 2 W-P This flower is small enough (less than 80mm) to qualify for the special class of intermediates. Thus, it can be exhibited as a regular standard daffodil or in its special intermediate class. It was hybridized by Sidney DuBose of California and registered in 1997. It blooms in mid-season.



'Katie Heath' 5 W-P This delicately colored flower has the nodding stance of a Division 5 daffodil. It is fun to watch in the garden as it opens with a yellow cup which then turns pink and finally fades to pinkish white. It was hybridized by Brent Heath of Virginia who registered it in 2002, naming it for his mother. It blooms mid-season. It prefers being planted in an area of good drainage.



'Cha-Cha' 6 W-GPP This flower has the reflexed (swept back) petals characteristic of a Division 6 daffodil. Its cup is a warm pink with a touch of green at the base. Brian Duncan of Northern Ireland is the hybridizer. It was registered in 1986. It blooms med-season to late.



'Sweet Smiles' 7 W-P This Division 7 flower belongs to the class of daffodils properly called jonquils. Like other jonquils, it usually has more than one floret per stem and is strongly scented. It was hybridized by Brent and Becky Heath of Virginia and registered in 2009. It blooms in mid-season.



'Mary Gay Lirette' 11a W-P This is a split-cup daffodil with the corona frilled and laid back on the petals. Though bred by Jack Gerritsen of the Netherlands, it has a Virginia connection, being named for a pianist friend of Brent and Becky Heath. It was registered in 2013. It is sweetly scented. It blooms early to mid-season.

2016 GCV Daffodil Collection

Described below is the daffodil collection for 2016. This year's selections are all varieties hybridized by breeders from Ireland and Northern Ireland. The special characteristics of each variety are detailed with their pictures. Look on the American Daffodil Society's site www.DaffSeek.org for more photos and information about each.

Note that all of these except 'Prototype' may be entered in the GCV class for the Frizzell Award. The Frizzell Award is for the best entry of three different Irish blooms from Divisions 1-4. 'Acropolis' may also be entered as a Classic daffodil because it was registered in 1955.



'Acropolis' 4W-O This is a double daffodil hybridized by J. Lionel Richardson of Ireland and registered in 1955. It blooms in mid-season. Because it was registered after 1940 but before 1969, it is classified as a Classic daffodil and can be shown in special classes for Classics as well as the regular classes.



'Goose Green' 3W-GYR This is a small-cupped daffodil. It was hybridized by Ballydorn Bulb Farm in Northern Ireland and registered in 1983. It blooms in mid-season.



'High Society' 2W-GWP This large-cupped daffodil has lovely coloring in the cup. Brian Duncan of Northern Ireland is the hybridizer. He registered it in 1979. It blooms mid-season.



'Manly' 4Y-O This is another daffodil hybridized by J. Lionel Richardson of Ireland. It was registered in 1972. It is a double flower with light yellow petals outside and orange segments in the center. It blooms mid-season.



'Prototype' 6Y-YPP Another daffodil from Brian Duncan of Northern Ireland registered in 1993. It features pale yellow petals swept back from a cup that shades from yellow to pink. It blooms mid-season.

2015 GCV Daffodil Collection

Described below is the daffodil collection for 2015. This year's selections are all varieties hybridized by Virginia breeders. The special characteristics of each variety are detailed with their pictures. Look on the American Daffodil Society's site www.DaffSeek.org for more photos and information about each. Note that all of these may be entered in the GCV class for the Louise Morris Goodwin Bowl and ADS Red-White-Blue Ribbon. Yazz and Sailboat may be entered for the GCV William G. Pannill award.



Curly Lace 11aY-Y This is a split-cupped daffodil hybridized by Brent and Becky Heath of Virginia and registered in 2009. It blooms early to mid-season. With a flower 75 mm wide, it qualifies as an Intermediate daffodil so can be entered in both Standard and Intermediate classes. It is fragrant.



Martinette 8Y-O This is a tazetta daffodil usually having 4-5 florets per stem. It was hybridized by Harry I. Tuggle, Jr. of Virginia, a prominent figure in the history of American daffodils. It is dated 1985. It blooms early to mid-season. It is fragrant.



Golden Echo 7WWY-Y This jonquilla daffodil may have 1-2 florets per stem. Brent Heath of Virginia is the hybridizer. He registered it in 2014. Also, in 2014, the American Daffodil Society awarded Golden Echo the Wister Award for outstanding garden merit. It blooms mid-season. It is fragrant.



Sailboat 7W-W This is also a jonquilla daffodil. It was hybridized by William G. Pannill of Virginia and registered in 1980. Known worldwide for his hybridizing and success as an exhibitor, Mr. Pannill was an honorary member of the GCV. This flower opens with a yellow cup which matures to white. It blooms mid-season-late. It is fragrant.



Yazz 7W-P Another jonquilla daffodil from William G. Pannill of Virginia registered in 1991. It features white petals and a pink cup. It blooms mid-season-late.

2014 GCV Daffodil Collection



DREAMLIGHT 3W-GWR, Late Blooming, Hybridized by Guy Wilson in Northern Ireland, Registered in 1934

The petals are very broad, rounded, pure white. The corona is white, tinged soft greenish grey, white at the base and narrow band of orange red at the rim. This flower can be entered as a single stem, vase of three, in the Historic Section (Section J) and in the Intermediate section (Section K) and as one of the three needed for the Gale and Lockwood Frizzell Award (Section N). In addition to being lovely it is a very useful flower to fill in

many sections in the show.



CHROMACOLOR 2W-P, Mid-Season, Hybridized in Virginia by Bill Pannill, Registered in 1976

Flower is 120mm wide. Resembles an improved 'Accent' of deeper pink color with a more widely expanded corona

This flower is eligible, in addition to single stem and vase of three exhibitions, to be included in the Red, White and Blue Collection (Section B, 18) and similarly Section A,6 under GCV Trophies, the Pannill Collection

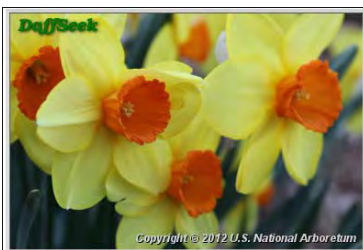
(Section A,11) and in the Pink cup collection (Section B, 14)



INTRIGUE 7Y-W, Late Blooming, Hybridized by Pannill in Virginia, Registered 1970

This is a multi-floriated flower with 2 to 3 flowers per stem which vary in size, the largest being 70 mm wide. Often six petals or more per bloom, broadly ovate, blunt and squarish at the apex. Blooms prominently mucronate, are brilliant yellow with band of white at the base of some of the mature flowers. Corona is shallow, funnel shaped, finely ribbed opens up yellow becoming white with the mouth straight or a little flared. The rim is crenate and sometimes rolled. Scented. This flower like the one before can be entered in the Red, White and Blue Class (Section B,18), the GCV equivalent (Section A,6) as well as Section A, Class 11 and the Reverse Bi-

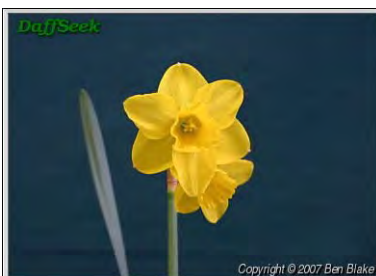
Color Collection (B,17).



MONAL 2Y-R, Very Early blooming, hybridized by Mitsch in Oregon, Registered 1976

One 100 mm flower per stem with broadly ovate petals, a blunt rich gold yellow and slightly white mucro. The corona is funnel shaped, smooth or lightly ribbed, a deep orange-red with straight mouth and a little frilled rim crenate. This flower can also be entered in Section A,6; Section B,18 being American bred. Also tis bloom is eligible for entry in the red orange cup

collection (Section B,13)



QUAIL 7Y-Y, Mid-Season blooming, Hybridized by Mitsch in Oregon, Registered 1974

Two or three flowers per stem each about 60 mm wide. Rich gold color perianth segments, broadly ovate with prominent white mucro. Funnel shaped corona, loosely ribbed and a little darker in color than the petals. Scented Can be entered in Section A,6 and Section B,18.

2013 Garden Club of Virginia Daffodil Collection



Dallas 3W-GWW

Registered before 1942, Bred by The Brodie of Brodie in Scotland, UK. Tall, late blooming with broadly ovated outer perianth segments, slightly reflexed. Corona very shallow, closely ribbed, white with pale green base, moth expanded and regularly frilled.

Ice Wings 5W-W

Registered in 1958 by Cyril F. Coleman of England. A mid season blooming triandrus with 2 to 3 pure white flowers per stem. Strongly reflexed. Corona two thirds the length of the perianth segments, cylindrical, lightly ribbed, mouth straight and wavy.

Ceylon 2Y-O (may be substituted for Ice Wings)

Registered before 1943 by J. Lionel Richardson of Ireland. Buttercup yellow petals with a red/orange cup; longest lasting, upfacing blossoms and a terrific perennial; 14"-16"; early-midseason.

Stainless 2W-W

Registered in 1960 by Guy Wilson of Northern Ireland. Mid season blooming; Outer perianth segments broadly ovated, midrib showing. Inner segments narrower, a little inflexed with margins wavy. Shallow bowl shaped corona, broad, ribbed, bluish white with crenate rim.

Weena 2W-W

Registered pre 1949 by Alexander Aherns from New Zealand.

White Plume 2W-W

Registered 1957 by Guy Wilson from Northern Ireland. Late blooming, perianth segments somewhat reflexed; corona long cup-shaped, with lime green at the base, frilled.

You will note that I have given you some suggestions for entering these blooms in classes other than standard singles.



Altun Ha 2yyw-w

A large cup daffodil, one flower to a stem. Blooms mid to late season. Was hybridized by Pearson in England and registered in 1987. It is a reverse bi-color.

Beryl 6w-yyo

A cyclamineus with one bloom per stem. Perianth segments significantly reflexed. Corona usually straight and narrow. Blooms mid-season, less than 1 inches tall. Hybridized by Williams in England, registered before 1907. Can be entered in the historic sections.

Fragrant Rose 2w-gpp

A large cup daffodil with one bloom per stem. White perianth segments. Deep reddish pink corona paling towards the base. Raspberry or rose scented. Bred by Brian Duncan in Northern Ireland and registered in 1978. Eligible for Frizzell Award. See Merlin below.

Jamestown 3w-gyy

Daffodils have thirteen descriptive divisions. Miniatures daffodils are not a separate division as they have the same descriptive characteristics as the standard daffodils however they have much smaller blooms, usually less than 1 ½ inches in diameter and usually do not grow more than 6" in height.

The bulbs in this dwarf collection are all good growers and great garden flowers, as well as perfect for rock gardens and containers, that should give you much joy in the years to come. It should be noted that only Segovia, Chiva and Little Gem are on the American Daffodil Society list of approved miniatures for showing.

Each collection will include 5 bulbs of each of the 5 cultivars listed below at a cost of \$15.00 per collection. 1Y-Y Division 1 with a golden yellow trumpet and petals. One bloom per stem. Very early. 4" – 5". 1938 Historic.

3W-Y Division 3. Pure White, rounded, overlapping petals surround a small the small, light yellow, flat cup. Mid-season. 5" – 6". 2004 Wister Award winner. 1996 AGM winner.



Chiva

7Y-Y Division 7 Jonquilla. Multi-headed variety of rupicola. Sweetly fragrant. Rush-like foliage. 3" – 5".



Diamond Ring

10Y-Y Bulbocodium Hybrid. Usually one flower per stem with possibility of four to eight blooms per bulb. Small flowers resemble a 'hoop petticoat' form. Mouth is slightly wavy, rim is entire and slightly darker in tone. Very early. 3" – 4".



Tiny Bubbles

12Y-Y Daffodils that do not fit into any other division. Tons of flowers. Prolific grower. Narrow foliage. Super fragrant. Mid-season. 4" – 6".

Minute Waltz 6 YYW-Y Midseason 13" Long tubular corona and reflexing perianth of bright lemon with a white halo; in sunny conditions, the corona becomes nearly white, except for a lemon slightly ruffled rim.



Protocol 6 W-W Early 11" A small flower, ideal for its division. Long tubular white corona with narrow base, slightly expanded at the margin. Rather narrow perianth with graceful reflex.



Pink Morn 2 W-GWP Late midseason 17". Broad, smooth white perianth with very clear pure pink mid-length corona with a green eye.

Granville Beauty 2 W-P Midseason. One flower to a stem, corona (cup) more than one third but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments (petals). Perianth segments ovate, mucronate, spreading, plane, with margins slightly wavy, somewhat creased, of heavy substance, overlapping; corona funnel-shaped, ribbed, reddish pink, mouth straight, wavy, with rim crenate.



Trumpet Warrior 1 YYW-WWY. Midseason 21". When mature the pure white trumpet is flared with a moderate lemon ruffle. Flat spade shaped perianth segments of sharp lemon with white halo. Probably our best reverse bicolor trumpet.

Oregon Pioneer 2 YP. Midseason. One flower to a stem, corona (cup) more than one third but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments (petals). Perianth segments broadly ovate, lemon yellow, spreading, plane, smooth and of heavy substance; corona straight-sided, opening lemon, becoming intense pink on rim and inside, light pink outside.



Vienna Woods 9 W-R Late 16" Rounded, poet white smooth perianth with a flat all red very small corona.

Cool River 11a W-Y Late- Midseason; Large spreading lemon yellow corona with beautiful ruffle. Relatively flat white perianth. Excellent grower and increaser.



Lady Alice 7 Y-Y Late; 24" Deep yellow jonquil with 2-3 florets per stem, with a light sweet fragrance. Slightly longer cup than that of Stratosphere. Strong tall stems hold flowers well above the foliage.



Ouzel 6 W-W Early-midseason. Opens with white perianth and pale lemon corona which becomes very white at maturity. Nicely reflexed and well proportioned flower, even though a bit larger than some of Div 6's.



Rose Lake 2 W-P Mid-season. One of your most beautiful pinks. Long funnel shaped corona of rich rose; broad flat perianth of white.



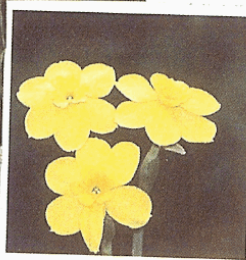
